
## Term 3 in Year 2





We are very proud of how well Year 2 have worked over the past term.






Year 2 has been working incredibly hard in their English lessons during Term 3. We have been writing lots of narratives and exploring different tenses and person.




During Term 3, Year 2 have been looking at Plants.

We have looked at the life cycle of a seed, the parts of a flower and plant as well as what plants need to survive and stay healthy.


We also filled the classroom with some plants and attempted to keep them alive and healthy all term!

The children have created some fantastic scenes using lots of new techniques such as sgraffito, pointillism and sponging.










Colour Wheel by Amelia
