


We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen:



One night Max puts on his wolf suit and makes mischief - so his mother calls him 'Wild Thing' and sends him to bed without his supper.



But when Max has sent the monsters to bed, and everything is quiet, he starts to feel lonely. He realises it is time to sail home to the place where someone loves him best of all.




The Jolly Postman by Janet and Allan Ahlberg:


Goldilocks and the Three Bears:

The Three Billy Goats Gruff:


When three billy goat brothers reach the bridge to the meadow, a slobbering troll blocks their path.

Three little pigs set off to build new homes for themselves. But someone big and bad soon comes looking for a tasty piggy snack... Can the pigs outwit the wicked wolf?




Spinderella by Julia Donaldson:

Spinderella has a passion for football, but she's not sure how many spiders should be on each team or how to count the goals! Luckily her Hairy Godmother is on hand to help...




The Extraordinary Gardener by Sam Boughton:


Jack and the Beanstalk:


Handa's Surprise by Eileen Browne:


Rosie's Walk by Pat Hutchins:

One disaster after another befalls the poor fox while Rosie goes on her way, supremely unaware of the danger behind her.




The Lion Inside by Rachel Bright:

She walks under the giraffes, over the sleepy crocodiles, past the enormous elephants and the chattering monkeys.


Then a Very Hungry Lion approaches Little Red, wanting to gobble her up...



Hello! Hello! by Brendan Wenzel


Brendan Wenzel presents a chain of animals of dazzling variety.


The See-Saw by Tom Percival:


Who's Hiding at the Seaside by Katherine McEwen:

There are lots of animals at the seaside, but where are they hiding and what are they doing?




Somebody Swallowed Stanley by Sarah Roberts:

Everybody has a taste for Stanley - and the other ocean creatures just keep mistaking him for a delicious treat - but this is no ordinary jellyfish.




Come Away from the Water, Shirley by John Burningham:


What to do with a Box by Jane Yolen




Tad by Benji Davies:

Meet Tad.


She's the smallest tadpole in a big pond, and lives there with all her tadbrothers and tadsisters.

Although something else lives there too... BIG BLUB! And when everyone else starts to disappear, Tad starts to wonder if Big Blub will get her too...




Omar, the Bees and Me by Helen Mortimer:

Omar, The Bees and Me encourages children to look after nature in local communities planting wild flowers to form bee corridors.




Up and Down by Oliver Jeffers




Little Glow

Poems to Perform by Julia Donaldson:




Supertato Veggies in the Valley of Doom by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet:


Supertato: Veggie's Assemble By Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet:

The Evil Pea is back on the loose and there's anarchy in the supermarket aisles again! Can our supermarket superhero divert disaster? Or is he going to need backup?




Superkid by Claire Freedman:


Pumpkin Soup by Helen Cooper:


Percy the Park Keeper After the Storm by Nick Butterworth:

A timeless tale of new beginnings. Each season of the year is brought to life.





A wordless adventure.




Dinosaur Roar by Paul and Henrietta Strickland:

Get ready to chomp, stomp and roar!




Bumpus Jumpus Dinosaurumpus by Tony Mitton:


The Fossil Girl by Catherine Brighton:

The creature could be twenty feet long, but nobody knows what it is. A giraffe? A crocodile? MAry is determined to find out.




A Girl Called Mary by G. D. Waters:




The Foggy Foggy Forest by Nick Sharratt:


The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson:






Man on the Moon by Simon Bartram:


Little People Big Dreams: Rosa Parks by Lisbeth Kaiser


Little People Big Dreams: Neil Armstrong by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara


The Pirate Cruncher by John Duddle:


The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch by Ronda and David Armitage:


The Snail and the Whale by Julia Donaldson:

A new pier is being built on Struay and everyone, especially Katie Morag, is very excited. The Islanders can't wait for all the changes they are sure the new pier will bring ...




The Queen's Nose by Dick King-Smith:


The King's Pants by Nicholas Allan:


A Puffin Book of Utterly Brilliant Poetry:


Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura:


Stig of the Dump by Clive King:


The Firework Maker's Daughter by Philip Pullman:




Beowulf by Michael Morpurgo:


The Mountain of Adventure by Enid Blyton:


Jake Atlas and the Tomb of the Emerald Snake by Rob Lloyd Jones:


The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett:


101 Poems for Children by Carol Ann Duffy:


Freedom by Catherine Johnson:


Pig Heart Boy by Malorie Blackman:

Felix has lived in a Catholic orphanage for over three years but always hopes that his Jewish bookseller parents to come for him. Alarmed by the sight of what he assumes are official 'librarians' burning Jewish books in the orphanage, he sets off in search of his parents to warn them of the danger. On his travels Felix uses his natural optimism and storytelling gift to explain away the horrific events he witnesses in Nazi-occupied Poland. His stories bring hope to the children of a ghetto and ultimately comfort to them on their final train journey.
